Evening settled quickly in the little village of Oberndorf, Austria. As the bright winter sun began to set, it was apparent that tonight was very different from any other night. Tonight was that special night that occurs only once each year—tonight was Christmas Evel Not just any December 24th, mind you, but Christmas Eve, 1818, at St. Nicholas Church. This night would see the premier performance of the newly composed carol, SILENT NIGHT.

As the story goes, the old church organ that had finally ceased to play was causing a major crisis. Instead of the glorious sounds of music, this special night would be silent! Frantically, Father Joseph Mohr wrote lyrics expressing his feelings about the evening's importance. Church organist Franz Gruber quickly set those lyrics to music arranged for voice and guitar, ready just in time for the evening's festivities.

SILENT NIGHT, enjoyed around the world, was written by two people who did not have the slightest pretence of being great poets or composers, or any knowledge of the impact their last minute rush of creativity would have!

Our performance of *CNCE UPON A SILENT NIGHT* touches upon the lastory of the beloved carol and cleverly interweaves a new, original melody with it. At the appropriate time, you will be asked to join in singing *SILENT NIGHT*, which is unquestionably the most celebrated of all Christmas earols!
