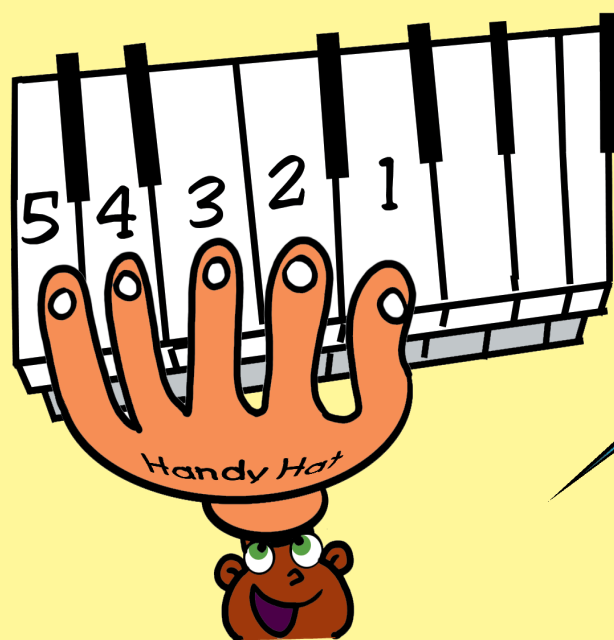
## Girls and Boys

Leave your beds and leave your sleep, and join your play-fel-lows in the street!



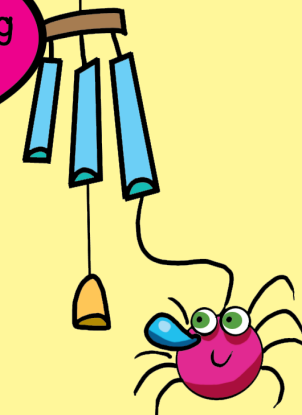

When you feel confident playing the tune, try adding this chime in the right hand every two bars.

# TECHNIX



A long curved line under or over a group of notes is called a phrase-mark. This group of notes is called a 'phrase' and should be played together smoothly.

**27** Ned and Grumper peered inside the piano. 'Halloo!', they cried. It was very echoey down there ...

Make up your own echo tunes. You can try singing them to each other, as well as playing.

The first player plays the tune loudly; the second player then echoes the tune as softly as possible (at the same pitch or at a different octave).
